

REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate

The Voice which Accompanies to the Other Side

Every element of the universe, even the most destructive, is listening for the voice of Our Lord, "Quiet, be still." In this Gospel story, the waters of chaos respond to the voice of the Lord of all creation, allowing Jesus to accompany his disciples to the other side of the Sea of Galilee.

We all know of times when chaos storms into our life, when we feel we are being swamped whether from outside or from some part of our own personality. Some part of our life is facing death. We may cry out to Jesus "Don't you care?"

He will come to accompany us but always to "the other side". Our Lord does not indulge the fantasy of "turning back the clock". We have to keep rowing in a new direction. There is no nostalgic return to the old situation. We may well feel displaced, disoriented, but Our Lord is our companion in the unfamiliar situation we have reached.

We could take a moment to pray for Our Lord to help us in all life-threatening situations, especially in the final transit through the wrenching chaos of death. May we hear him rebuke the Prince of Darkness and Death: "Quiet, be still" as he accompanies us to the other side, to the promised land of Heaven.

HOLY ORDERS

The sacrament of Holy Orders confers the gift of the Holy Spirit on those who exercise a sacred duty as ministers of the Church. Called from the community of the baptised, the men are ordained for service of the Church, especially in pastoral and liturgical areas of Church life. While all the baptised are called to the one holy priesthood in Christ, Holy Orders is termed the ministerial or hierarchical priesthood and is oriented to serve the Christian community.

Since the time of the apostles, the ordained ministry has been given a share in Christ's mission and authority. They have been set apart to build up the Church. There are three degrees of holy orders: bishops, priests, and deacons. Bishops and priests participate in the ministerial priesthood of Christ, deacons share in Christ's ministry of service.

By the imposition of hands and the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, bishops are marked with the fullness of the sacrament of orders. They are a visible bond of the unity of the Church and act collegially with other bishops. As teachers, priests and pastors of their flocks, bishops regulate the effective celebration of the sacraments. They are the primary ministers of Confirmation and confer the sacrament of Holy Orders. Only priests may be appointed as bishops.

Priests are joined to bishops and each other by the bond of priesthood. As co-workers, they are called to serve the Church under the bishop's authority, promising obedience. Through the laying on of hands and anointing with sacred Chrism, priests are marked with an indelible character. They are charged to preach the Gospel, offer pastoral care and celebrate divine worship, modelling their lives on the Good Shepherd. They have a primary role in celebrating the sacraments and other rites. Central is their celebration of Eucharist, the summit and source of the Church's activity. Priests are deacons prior to ordination and commit themselves to a life of celibacy.

Deacons share in Christ's grace and mission in a special way. They are ordained for a ministry of service and have a particular relationship with the bishop, especially in the liturgy. During ordination the men receive the imposition of hands and are charged to be ministers of the Gospel and exercise works of charity. Deacons are instituted as acolytes and lectors prior to their ordination. They may officiate at weddings and funerals, baptise, preach and lead ritual blessings. Deacons are ordinary ministers of communion. There are two types of deacons in the Church. Men who are preparing to become priests are known as transitional deacons. Permanent deacons are not ordained to the priesthood and are married or celibate.

REMEMBER: Let's Stay COVID Safe
