**Mt 2:13-15, 19-23**

*A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew.*

After the wise men had left, the angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, 'Get up, take the child and his mother with you, and escape into Egypt, and stay there until I tell you, because Herod intends to search for the child and do away with him.' So Joseph got up and, taking the child and his mother with him, left that night for Egypt, where he stayed until Herod was dead. This was to fulfil what the Lord had spoken through the prophet:

I called my son out of Egypt.

After Herod's death, the angel of the Lord appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt and said, 'Get up, take the child and his mother with you and go back to the land of Israel, for those who wanted to kill the child are dead.' So Joseph got up and, taking the child and his mother with him, went back to the land of Israel. But when he learnt that Archelaus had succeeded his father Herod as ruler of Judaea he was afraid to go there, and being warned in a dream he left for the region of Galilee. There he settled in a town called Nazareth. In this way the words spoken through the prophets were to be fulfilled:

**REFLECTION**

**Adolescent impatience**

*Forget the tinselly sentimentality of most depictions of the Holy Family. This Gospel is real life. Anyone who has temporarily lost their child in a crowd knows the stabbing pain of uncertainty and fear. Even more real, and occurring more often, is the adolescent impatience of Jesus: 'Did you not know I must be about my Father's business?'*

*Every parent, bewildered and saddened by the growing up and the growing distance of a son or daughter, knows what Mary and Joseph must have felt.*

*By the time Mary and Joseph found Jesus, he had found the words to express his unique identity. In this little scene so full of pathos and heartbreak, we hear the first words of Jesus in the Gospels: 'Did you not know I must be about my Father's business?'*

*What was his 'Father's business' which was so engaging for Jesus? To draw every human being into the same family relationship as He enjoys.*

*But did you note that it is our privilege to celebrate this realisation as a community? Only Jesus can say 'My Father'. We say 'Our Father'. We enter into the grace of intimate relationship with God, not as an atomised individual, but as a person within a society of baptised Christians – the Church.*

*We could take a moment to pray for the integrity which will enable us to express this sense of identity in the unfolding of our lives. We can pray also for those saddened or bewildered by our following of the One who taught us to pray 'Our Father'.*

# The Holy Family

Our joy at the birth of Jesus cannot be contained in just one day of celebration yesterday. Rather it overflows into a whole week of celebration and rejoicing, including today's feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. Let us continue to rejoice in this gift of God's love, made manifest for us in the new-born child of Bethlehem.

Today's first reading tells the story of another holy family, that of Elkanah and his wife, Hannah. When their son Samuel is born, Hannah dedicates him to service in the Temple as a gift in return for the gift of his birth.

In this psalm, devotion and love of God is expressed in devotion and love of the house of God, the Temple, which was considered to be the special dwelling place of God's presence on earth.

In the second reading, this reflection from John's first Letter on the fact of our being children of God is appropriate in this season of the Incarnation. Through this mystery, we have been 'adopted' by God as God's own beloved children.

Apart from the infancy narratives, today's Gospel tells us almost all we know of the Holy Family. Unique to Luke's Gospel, we hear the story of the finding of the child Jesus in the Temple after three days. In this, it prefigures another story of finding Jesus, again, after three days.

## 2021 Christmas Collection

Donations from this year's collections at Christmas Mass will be used to assist Ratheesh in India.

Ratheesh Pushkkaran is a young, Hindu, disabled man. He is an artist, living with his mother and his child, as his wife left him. In the last floods his motorbike was damaged as well as his laptop, on which he does his artwork. He is now going to his office by taxi and is left with nothing after paying for the taxi. A new laptop for him to complete his work and continue to earn money will cost approximately \$1200 and repairs to his bike will cost approximately \$500.

## Let's Stay COVID Safe at Mass
