9 January 2022

First Reading Is 42:1-4, 6-7 A reading from the prophet Isaiah.

Thus says the Lord:

Here is my servant whom I uphold, my chosen one in whom my soul delights. I have endowed him with my spirit that he may bring true justice to the nations.

He does not cry out or shout aloud, or make his voice heard in the streets. He does not break the crushed reed, nor quench the wavering flame. Faithfully he brings true justice; he will neither waver, nor be crushed until true justice is established on earth, for the islands are awaiting his law.

I, the Lord, have called you to serve the cause of right;

I have taken you by the hand and formed you;

I have appointed you as covenant of the people and light of the nations, to open the eyes of the blind, to free captives from prison, and those who live in darkness from the dungeon.

God had anointed him with the Holy Spirit and with power, and because God was with him, Jesus went about doing good and curing all who had fallen into the power of the devil.'

REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate

Jesus' Baptism is Ours

What did it mean for Jesus to come up out of the waters of the Jordan to experience the special presence of the Holy Spirit as though it were a dove, gently hovering over him? As a Jew, he would have been reminded both of the Divine Wind hovering over the void-become-creation, and of the dove bearing an olive twig as God restored humanity's life on earth after the Flood. The Holy Spirit was empowering Him for a re-creative role on behalf of humanity.

His second experience was to sense God's delight and joy sounding, reverberating through every fibre of his body, every reach of his soul: 'You are my beloved Son, my favour rests on you.'

Any baby, any adolescent, any adult who is baptised shares in these wonderful experiences. The dynamic power of the Holy Spirit hovers over the person as a gentle presence, preparing the one baptised for a mission on behalf of humanity. And every baptised person senses, below the range of hearing, the echo of the same marvellous words: "You are my beloved son or daughter, my favour rests on you."

Is it any wonder that Our Lord adopted this water rite to incorporate his followers into such wonderful experiences as a powerfull impetus to fulfil their mission to cooperate in God's saving plan for humanity?

We could take a moment to pray in gratitude for the parent/s or other person/s who brought us into this tradition stretching over almost two millennia. May they be filled with all that flows from their being beloved sons and daughters of God.


COMMUNION ANTIPHON:

Changes to COVID-19 Restrictions

Reduced COVID-19 restrictions are now in place from 15 December 2021. When attending a Place of Worship, you will still need to check in using the Service NSW QR code or place your name on the sheet. The Baptism of the Lord

As we transition from the Season of Christmas to the Season of Ordinary Time, today's feast reminds us of the importance our own baptism – we are not called to be mere spectators of the life in the Church. Rather, we too, are called to be God's beloved daughters and sons.

From the prophet Isaiah, today's first reading has echoes of our Advent readings which proclaim the coming of the Lord announced by the Lord's messenger. We have long identified this reading with John the Baptist and his call to prepare for the coming of the Lord.

Today's psalm is a hymn of praise to God who is depicted as a mighty cosmic warrior who is the giver of all life and whose very spirit renews the face of the earth.

In his letter to the leader of the Christian Community in Crete, Paul outlines the reason why we should live good lives – it is our hope for the blessing which will come with the appearing of our saviour, Jesus Christ.

In today's Gospel Reading, John the Baptist downplays his role while at the same time pointing to the greatness of the One who is to come.

Ratheesh Pushkkaran is a young, Hindu, disabled man. He is an artist, living with his mother and his child, as his wife left him. In the last floods his motorbike was damaged as well as his laptop, on which he does his artwork. He is now going to his office by taxi and is left with nothing after paying for the taxi. A new laptop for him to complete his work and continue to earn money will cost approximately \$1200 and repairs to his bike will cost approximately \$500.
