



First Reading Ezekiel 17:22-24
A reading from the prophet Ezekiel.

The Lord says this:

'From the top of the cedar,

from the highest branch I will take a shoot and plant it myself on a very high mountain.

I will plant it on the high mountain of Israel.

It will sprout branches and bear fruit, and become a noble cedar.

Every kind of bird will live beneath it, every winged creature rest in the shade of its branches.

And every tree of the field will learn that I, the Lord, am the one who stunts tall trees and makes the low ones grow, who withers green trees and makes the withered green.

I, the Lord, have spoken, and I will do it.'

Responsorial Psalm Ps 91:2-3. 13-16. R. see v.2

(R.) Lord, it is good to give thanks to you.

It is good to give thanks to the Lord to make music to your name, O Most High, to proclaim your love in the morning and your truth in the watches of the night. (R.)

The just will flourish like the palm-tree and grow like a Lebanon cedar. (R.)

Planted in the house of the Lord they will flourish in the courts of our God, still bearing fruit when they are old, still full of sap, still green, to proclaim that the Lord is just. In him, my rock, there is no wrong. (R.)

Second Reading 2 Corinthians 5:6-10A reading from the second letter of St Paul to the Corinthians.

We are always full of confidence when we remember that to live in the body means to be exiled from the Lord, going as we do by faith and not by sight – we are full of confidence, I say, and actually want to be exiled from the body and make our home with the Lord. Whether we are living in the body or exiled from it, we are intent on pleasing him. For all the truth about us will be brought out in the law court of Christ, and each of us will get what he deserves for the things he did in the body, good or bad.

Gospel Mark 4:26-34 A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark.

Jesus said to the crowds, 'This is what the kingdom of God is like. A man throws seed on the land. Night and day, while he sleeps, when he is awake, the seed is sprouting and growing; how, he does not know. Of its own accord the land produces first the shoot, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear. And when the crop is ready, he loses no time; he starts to reap because the harvest has come.'

He also said, 'What can we say the kingdom of God is like? What parable can we find for it? It is like a mustard seed which at the time of its sowing in the soil is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; yet once it is sown it grows into the biggest shrub of them all and puts out big branches so that the birds of the air can shelter in its shade.'

Using many parables like these, he spoke the word to them, so far as they were capable of understanding it. He would not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything to his disciples when they were alone.

Francis' Focus

In today's Gospel, Pope Francis reminds us, Jesus 'teaches us that even everyday things ... are inhabited by God's hidden presence.'

This should encourage us. As the Pope suggests, 'with this parable Jesus wants to instil us with confidence.' We can trust that God is still mysteriously at work building His Kingdom.

After all, the Kingdom of God is already growing – even if we do not readily see it. 'At times,' the Pope says, 'the din of the world, along with the many activities that fill our days, prevent us from stopping and seeing how the Lord is conducting history.'

'The Gospel asks us to take a fresh look at ourselves and at reality,' the Pope says. He adds that 'it asks us to have bigger eyes, that are able to see further, especially beyond appearances, in order to discover the presence of God who as humble love is always at work in the soil of our life and that of history.'

We should, therefore, be open to seeing God at work in the smallest of places.

But we are also called to be more than passive spectators. Jesus wants us to become cultivators of the Kingdom. While the mysterious growth of the Kingdom is the work of God, we all have a part to play in God's plan. 'It is up to us to sow,' the Pope points out, 'and to sow with love, with dedication and with patience.'


Parish Property update BRANXTON PARISH

Over the past few years, the Branxton Parish has been in negotiations to sell the vacant lot of land at 46 Station Street between the old convent and old presbytery. This sale has now settled for the purchase price of \$380,000. Thank you to the Finance Council and the Diocesan Legal Department for their work on this sale. A fence has now been erected across the property and can no longer be used for parish parking.



SINGLETON PARISH

Singleton Parish have been in discussions for many years as to how the land which housed the old Catholic Junior School, in Patrick Street should be utilised. After the fire and subsequent demolition of the buildings, the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle showed an interest in the land and valuations were completed and agreed upon by the Finance Council, Pastoral Council and Property Management Team. The land has now been transferred into the name of the Diocese and the Parish has received \$4,000,000 for the parcel of land known as Lot 3 DP 1070881, 6 Patrick Street, bounded by Queen and Boundary Streets. The parcel of land is 18,460m² and includes the St Nicholas Early Education Centre and the house on the corner of Queen Street. The Parish Finance and Pastoral Councils met on Wednesday 5 June 2024. The \$4m will be placed in a term deposit with the Catholic Community Fund while options for investing the money to create a sustainable income stream for the Parish can be investigated. Again, thank you to all who were involved over the years in discussions regarding this parcel of land.
