he Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary is a feast that commemorates the birthday of Jesus' mother. Even though Mary's birth is not recorded in the scriptures, it is mentioned in the Apocryphal writings from the second century, the Protoevangelium of James and is even mentioned in Islamic scripture. Her parents are named as Saint Anne and Saint Joachim and tradition places Mary's birthplace in Jerusalem. The feast has been celebrated since the fifth century – on September 8 in the Roman Calendar.

Francis' Focus

Pope Francis draws our attention to an interesting aspect of today's Gospel passage. 'The first thing Jesus does,' the Pope notes, 'is take the man far from the crowd.'

The Pope suggests that in doing so Jesus 'doesn't want to publicise this deed he intends to carry out.' Jesus avoids turning the incident into a self-promotion exercise. His focus remains on the man concerned.

On another occasion, the Pope says that this incident shows that Jesus 'does not want to impress people; He is not seeking popularity or success, but wishes only to do good to people. With this attitude, He teaches us that good is to be done without clamour, without ostentation.'

'The lesson we can take from this episode,' the Pope affirms, 'is that God is not closed in on himself, but instead he opens himself and places himself in communication with humanity.'

With that in mind, we can reflect on what it means for us. 'Jesus revealed to us the secret of a miracle that we too can imitate,' the Pope suggests. By 'becoming protagonists of "Ephphatha"' we can be the ones who open the world to Jesus. We should always be conscious of the needs of others. In doing so, we might just open their hearts and minds to Jesus

Promoters of Safeguarding Update - September 2024

The Promoters of Safeguarding continue to endorse a culture of safeguarding within each Parish. Firstly, I would like to introduce the Promoters for our Parishes: myself, Niamh Marzol from Singleton and Lydia Gorczyca who represents the Branxton Parish.

Promoters of Safeguarding Network Meetings are facilitated by the Office of Safeguarding for all parish representatives to attend and discuss all things Safeguarding. Previous meetings were used to discuss the audit process and requirements. If you would be interested in attending these meetings, please contact the Parish Office.

We would like to draw your attention to the second meeting for 2024 which was held on Thursday 18 July in East Maitland. Unfortunately, I was unable to attend, however, below is a summary of the meeting. The main focus of the day was on the document: ADAPTION OF THE SAFEGUARDING MODELS OF THE NATIONAL DISABILITIES SERVICES AND THE NSW AGEING & DISABILITY COMMISSION.

Topics addressed in the safeguarding of vulnerable persons were:

1. The Church's understanding of a vulnerable person as legislated by Pope Francis:

"...any person in a state of infirmity, physical or mental deficiency, or deprivation of personal liberty which, in fact, even occasionally, limits their ability to understand or to want or otherwise resist an offence".

2. The Diocese's operational definition of a vulnerable person:

An adult living with physical disability, chronic or persistent mental illness, neurodiversity, developmental delay or other cognitive disability

3. Abuse types

- a. **Emotional/Psychological abuse** abuse that occurs when a person is subjected to behaviours or actions aimed at preventing or controlling their behaviour with the intent to cause them emotional harm of fear through manipulation, isolation or intimidation.
- b. **Neglect** A failure to provide the basic physical and emotional necessities of life. Occurs when the vulnerable person's primary carer/entity providing care fails to meet their duty of care / statutory / contractual obligation.
- c. *Physical abuse* Intentional bodily injury. Some examples include slapping, pinching, choking, kicking, shoving, or inappropriately using drugs or physical restraints.
- d. *Financial* the improper use of another person's assets or the use or withholding of another person's resources usually committed by carers, families or guardians who act formally or informally as financial advisers.
- e. **Sexual Abuse** non-consensual sexual contact, exploitative behaviour, rape and indecent assault, sexual harassment or sexual interference in any form.
- f. **Coercive control** assault, threats, humiliation and intimidation or other abuse that is used to intimidate the victim to make them subservient and obedient to the wishes of the abuser.

4. Individual risk factors affecting vulnerable persons

- Social isolation, lack of social connections with family, neighbours, community
- Confusion/uncertainty about what is their property or belongings
- Deteriorating health, cognitive decline, dementia and capacity issues
- Personality and behaviour change due to illness and/or other factors
- History of family dysfunction, domestic and family violence and abuse
- Insecure accommodation and financial difficulties
- Substance abuse and other addictive behaviours e.g. gambling
- Relative powerlessness because of diminished abilities
- Women who have experienced (often unreported) domestic violence for many years
- Limited English, cultural issues and dependency

5. Reporting abuse of vulnerable adults

The Diocese is committed to safeguarding vulnerable persons <u>BUT</u> as a Church we believe in and defend principles of self-determination (Free Will). Vulnerable adults should be in control of reporting their own situation and are free to make poor, even self-destructive choices <u>IF</u> they have the mental capacity to do so.

Mental capacity

'capacity'- the ability to make decisions about things that affect a person's daily life.

Capacity includes:

- where to live and what to buy, what support or services are needed
- when to go to the doctor or agreeing to medical treatment and matters of importance (legal consequences) e.g. entering into a contract

Capacity assessment principles

- Presumption of capacity don't assume lack of capacity based on appearances
- Assess the person's decision-making ability not the decision they make
- Respect a person's privacy and only substitute decision-making as a last resort

Tips on assessing capacity

- Ensure the person is informed tell them about the process
- Be flexible in how you approach assessing the person's capacity
- Don't make value judgments avoid influencing or pressuring the person
- · Be clear about what you are assessing
