REFLECTION BY FR MICHAEL TATE

What are we to make of the famous reply of Jesus to Pilate: 'My kingdom is not of this world'? Left there, it sounds as though Jesus is talking about a realm which is far removed from terrestrial concerns. Perhaps our task as his followers is to meditate into a blissful nothingness, to live other-worldly lives.

It is a poor translation, and it should read: 'My kingdom is not **from** this world. If my kingdom were from this world, my followers would have fought to stop my being handed over.' Of all the ways in which our Lord could have contrasted his realm with all the other ways in which societies are ruled, he chose a contrast about the use of force. Rather, his reign springs from his Father's will that humanity should live together in a realm of non-violence.

We can easily criticise ISIL's blasphemous use of barbaric violence in the supposed service of religion. It is the most extreme opposite of Our Lord's teaching which He embodied in his practice. But, even for us, the challenge is there to restrain too-ready resort to armed violence and to humanely moderate its exercise where it is used to protect the innocent.

We could pause for a moment to pray for the coming of the Kingdom, not as an 'out of this world' experience, but in the words of the Our Father: 'Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven.'

Resumption of Communion from the Chalice

Before the advent of COVID-19, Communion from the Chalice was regularly available at Masses in the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle. When Churches were allowed to open again for the celebration of liturgy, the impact of COVID continued to be felt in a seismic shift in the liturgical practice of the diocese, including the withdrawal of Communion from the Chalice. COVID, the Flu, and RSV are not going anywhere. As with life in general, we learn to live with them, taking responsibility and care for not only ourselves but also for all people. It is time to consider removing the blanket restriction on the resumption of Communion from the Chalice and leaving the decision to individual members of the faithful, who, as before COVID, make a personal choice as to whether they receive Communion from the Chalice.

As of <u>Sunday 1 December</u>, communion in both species will be offered at all Masses in our Parishes. To facilitate this, Extraordinary Ministers of Communion are required for each Mass. If you wish to volunteer for this ministry, please place your name on the sheets at the back of the church. Formation will then be offered prior to 1 December.

New Rosters are being prepared for St. Brigid's and St Patrick's. Please let us know if you still wish to be included on the roster. Indicate on the sheet on the noticeboard if you wish to minister as Proclaiming the Word, Offertory Procession and/or Special Minister.

Why do we pray to St Michael the Archangel?

People pray to St Michael for many reasons including:

Protection St. Michael is considered a spiritual warrior who protects people from Satan and evil. The St. Michael Chaplet

is a prayer that asks St. Michael to intercede in times of struggle and to strengthen people against evil.

Intercession St. Michael is a powerful intercessor who can help people grow closer to God.


Community The St. Michael Prayer unites Catholics in a shared understanding of spiritual battles and fosters a sense of
