The Nativity of the Lord (Christmas)

First Reading Is 52:7-10 A reading from the prophet Isaiah.

How beautiful on the mountains, are the feet of one who brings good news, who heralds peace, brings happiness, proclaims salvation, and tells Zion, 'Your God is king!' Listen! Your watchmen raise their voices, they shout for joy together, for they see the Lord face to face, as he returns to Zion. Break into shouts of joy together, vou ruins of Jerusalem: for the Lord is consoling his people. redeeming Jerusalem. The Lord bares his holy arm in the sight of all the nations, and all the ends of the earth shall see the salvation of our God. The Word of the Lord Thanks be to God.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 97:1-6 R.v.3

(R.) All the ends of the earth have seen the saving power of God.

Sing a new song to the Lord for he has worked wonders. His right hand and his holy arm have brought salvation. (*R*.)

The Lord has made known his salvation; has shown his justice to the nations. He has remembered his truth and love for the house of Israel. (*R.*)

All the ends of the earth have seen the salvation of our God. Shout to the Lord all the earth, ring out your joy. *(R.)*

Second Reading Heb 1:1-6 A reading from the letter to the Hebrews.

At various times in the past and in various different ways, God spoke to our ancestors through the prophets; but in our own time, the last days, he has spoken to us through his Son, the Son that he has appointed to inherit everything and through whom he made everything there is. He is the radiant light of God's glory and the perfect copy of his nature, sustaining the universe by his powerful command; and now that he has destroyed the defilement of sin, he has gone to take his place in heaven at the right hand of divine Majesty. So he is now as far above the angels as the title which he has inherited is higher than their own name. God has never said to any angel: You are my Son, today I have become your father, or: I will be a father to him and he a son to me. Again, when he brings the Firstborn into the world, he says: Let all the angels of God worship him. The Word of the Lord **Thanks be to God.**

The Word was made flesh, he lived among us. And we saw his glory, the glory that is his as the only Son of the Father, full of grace and truth. REFLECTION BY LISA-MARIE CALDERONE-STEWART

For people surrounded by department store decorations, commercials, Christmas carols, special foods, and the like, believing that today's Christmas celebration actually evolved from the humble story of a young woman giving birth in the straw is a stretch. It might help to focus on the characters involved.

What do you think went through Joseph's mind as he witnessed Mary giving birth to a baby? What do you think went through Mary's mind as she struggled with the birth experience?

The Christmas story is full of symbols. Jesus, who becomes our bread and wine – our nourishment – is laid in a manger, the feeding trough for the animals. Jesus, who is the champion of poor people, is born into a homeless family. Poor shepherds were the first to welcome the Messiah that the Jewish people had been awaiting for generations. The symbol of angels singing, praising God, and flying madly all over the sky was a good clue that something out of the ordinary was happening.

Modern Christmas stories use different symbols to make the same points: Rudolph, the 'poorest' reindeer, becomes the champion; and Frosty, a snowman, transforms children's lives.

Vanuatu has experienced two earthquakes within 24 hours impacting over 116,000 people and causing significant damage to buildings and infrastructure. The main hospital in Port Vila has sustained extensive damage and is overwhelmed by the mass causalities. There are

hundreds of people injured or trapped under rubble and at least 14 people have died with the death toll expected to continue to rise. People remain fearful of further disaster, as Vanuatu is one of the most susceptible countries to natural disasters such as earthquakes, storm damage, flooding, and tsunamis. Hope Tree 2024 CHRISTMAS COLLECTION - FREE MEDICAL CAMPS

There is only one collection taken at Christmas Masses, and this year it will be used to help fund *AYUSH free medical camps in villages in the Koraput District of Odisha, India*.

These communities face numerous health challenges due to the absence of primary healthcare centres and limited access to medical services. The residents often suffer from infections caused by contaminated water, malnutrition, anaemia, and other health issues, which remain unaddressed due to the lack of medical facilities.

AYUSH medical camps are temporary outreach units that offer treatment using indigenous systems of medicine, such as Ayurveda, Yoga & Naturopathy, Unani, Homeopathy, Siddha, and Sowa Rigpa.

The primary goal of these AYUSH free medical camps is to provide free healthcare services, raise health awareness, and offer basic medicines to those in need. They plan to conduct two camps per month and the specific objectives of the camps are:

- Vital signs check-up: To identify common and prevalent health issues.
- Health Education: To provide guidance on hygiene practices, nutrition, and preventable diseases.
- **Provide medicines**: To providebasic medicines for common ailments and refer individuals for further medical care if necessary.

Key health concerns in these villages include:

- Malnutrition: Many children are underweight, have stunted growth, and suffer from anemia.
- Infectious Diseases: Respiratory infections, and skin conditions like scabies and impetigo.
- Women's Health: Musculoskeletal issues, anemia, headaches, and dental problems.
- Men's Health: Respiratory issues, orthopedic problems, anemia, and hypertension.

The request is for \$2500 to cover the costs of camps over the next four months. Funds will be used to cover doctor fees, medical staff, medicines, travel, food, awareness materials, and other related expenses to have a significant impact on the health and well-being of the villagers.
