Saints Peter and Paul, Apostles

29 June 2025

Acts 12:1-11 **First Reading** A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

King Herod started persecuting certain members of the Church. He beheaded James the brother of John, and when he saw that this pleased the Jews he decided to arrest Peter as well. This was during the days of Unleavened Bread, and he put Peter in prison, assigning four squads of four soldiers each to guard him in turns. Herod meant to try Peter in public after the end of Passover week. All the time Peter was under guard the Church prayed to God for him unremittingly. On the night before Herod was to try him, Peter was sleeping between two soldiers, fastened with double chains, while guards kept watch at the main entrance to the prison. Then suddenly the angel of the Lord stood there, and the cell was filled with light. He tapped Peter on the side and woke him. 'Get up!' he said 'Hurry!' - and the chains fell from his hands. The angel then said, 'Put on your belt and sandals. After he had done this, the angel next said, 'Wrap your cloak round you and follow me.' Peter followed him, but had no idea that what the angel did was all happening in reality; he thought he was seeing a vision. They passed through two guard posts one after the other, and reached the iron gate leading to the city. This opened of its own accord; they went through it and had walked the whole length of one street when suddenly the angel left him. It was only then that Peter came to himself. 'Now I know it is all true,' he said. 'The Lord really did send his angel and has saved me from Herod and from all that the Jewish people were so certain would happen to me.'

Gospel Acclamation Matthew 16:18


Alleluia, alleluia! You are Peter, the rock on which I will build my Church: the gates of hell will not hold out against it. Alleluia!

When Jesus came to the region of Caesarea Philippi he put this question to his disciples, 'Who do people say the Son of Man is?' And they said, 'Some say he is John the Baptist, some Elijah, and others Jeremiah or one of the prophets.' 'But you,' he said, 'who do you say I am?' Then Simon Peter spoke up, 'You are the Christ,' he said, 'the Son of the living God.' Jesus replied, 'Simon son of Jonah, you are a happy man! Because it was not flesh and blood that revealed this to you but my Father in heaven. So I now say to you: You are Peter and on this rock I will build my Church. And the gates of the underworld can never hold out against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven: whatever you bind on earth shall be considered bound in heaven; whatever you loose on earth shall be considered loosed in heaven.'

LEO'S LENS REFLECTION BY NICK BRODIE

Tellingly, it is the question that elicits the answer in today's Gospel. Jesus is the Christ who is unafraid to ask and listen before affirming what is true.

This is an idea which Pope Leo XIV picks up on. Reflecting on how his predecessor and namesake 'lived in an age of momentous and disruptive change', Leo clearly admires how Leo XIII 'sought to promote peace by encouraging social dialogue between capital and labour, technology and human intelligence, and different political cultures and nations.

The Church's social doctrine, these popes remind us, is not incompatible with dialogue. Leo calls on Christians to seek 'to learn how to confront problems, for these always different, since generation is new, and faces new challenges, dreams and questions.'

It is therefore always imperative that we listen to the voices of the poor and marginalised, Leo says. 'Their viewpoints,' he points out, 'are vital if we are to see the world through God's eyes.'

Reminding us that the Second Vatican Council called the Church to engage in 'reading the signs of the times and of interpreting them in the light of the Gospel'. Leo invites us 'to participate actively and creatively in this discernment process, and thus contribute, with all of God's people, to the development of the Church's social doctrine in this age of significant social changes, listening to everyone and engaging in dialogue with all.'

Changes to Parish Collections

After a long period of consultation between Parish Clergy, Parish Finance Councils and Parish Administration as well as members of the Bishop's staff, the following changes to parish collections will be effective from 1 July 2025.

- A new modernised monthly levy system, which will significantly reduce the administration burden on our parish staff and allow parishes to manage their finances more effectively.
- 1st and 2nd collections will remain. These are both essential for the sustainability of our parish community.
- Both collections will now support Clergy across the Diocese, our Parishes and the broader Diocesan community.
- The new levy system will provide parishes with increased access to broader Diocesan services and support. The nature of the services means there will no longer be tax deductions available to parishioners for these contributions.
- By removing the tax-deductible component of planned giving, we seek to further ease the administrative burden of our Parishes. The current practice of issuing tax receipts has become increasingly onerous in comparison to the tax deduction benefit for parishioners.

Your valued contributions will continue to benefit the Parish and the work of the Church and we foresee these changes to Planned Giving to be overwhelmingly positive for our parish communities. There are no immediate changes to the way your planned giving is collected. However, for those who used the mass app, please note that this will be no longer be available from July.

We thank you for your ongoing financial support. If you have any questions regarding these changes, please speak with your Parish Priest or Parish Secretary who have more detailed information.

SCriptural Goneeku

When the gospel writer has Jesus declare that he will give to Peter the keys of the kingdom of heaven, he is quoting almost directly from a verse in Isaiah, "I will place on his shoulder the key to the house of David; what he opens no one can shut, and what he shuts no one can open." (22:22). The passage in Isaiah is about the appointment of a steward – a caretaker – for the people of Jerusalem. It makes clear that the one appointed carries the authority of the Lord who appoints him. When almost the same words are used about Peter, it carries the meaning from its original context.

Who do you say I am?

The question Jesus puts to his disciples is the very same question that he puts to us every day of our lives, "Who do you say I am?" How we choose to answer that question will be reflected in our attitude towards self, others and to life itself. How we answer that question will change frequently throughout life as experience and changing spirituality lead us into asking other questions of ourselves. If we hold that the teaching and example of Jesus are important to us, then we are bound to strive towards emulating them in our own lives.



Stone or Rock?

An argument exists about the translation of the naming of Peter as the rock on which the Church will be built. In Greek, the line can be translated as 'you are a small stone and on this large rock...'. In this argument, the role of Peter is diminished but the large rock referred to is either Jesus himself or Peter's declaration of faith. However, in Aramaic (spoken by Jesus) the word Kepha or Cephas is used for both Peter's name and the word for rock. Those who seek to diminish the role of the papacy in the Church will argue about the translation of this line.

Jesus anointed Peter as the leader of his church and said to him, "I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven". As the leader of the Catholic Church, the Pope has on his papal crest the keys of Peter. Colour in the papal crest of Pope Leo XIV.
